In 2021, the company initiated preparations for a project named Sequoia Hills, envisioned as "A Breathing City"—a residential development designed to offer a lush, green environment complemented by modern urban-scale amenities to support the daily needs of residents in the Sentul area.

In addition, the company is also working on Holdwell Business Park, a modern commercial complex located in Lampung. This project is anticipated to become the largest business and commercial hub in Lampung City, serving as a strategic link between Sumatra and other islands.

Beyond these ongoing developments, the company is also planning several new projects, including Tanamori in Labuan Bajo—a 246-hectare development aimed at becoming a world-class, sustainable tourism destination.


By analyzing resource use and waste management, the report offers insights to raise awareness and foster responsibility among employees, encouraging their active participation in sustainability initiatives.

The chart on the side shows the paper usage per ream across six Triniti Land projects.


Among these projects, PTB had the lowest paper usage, using only 5 reams in Q1 2025.

On the other hand, TMS had the highest paper consumption, using 90 reams in Q1 2025. The significant paper usage at TMS is a result of the large number of physical documents still being used, which requires more paper.

The chart on the side shows the fuel usage per liter across six Triniti Land projects.


This high fuel consumption at TMS is due to the extensive construction of The Scott-Collins Boulevard.

From the chart, it is evident that TMS is the largest fuel consumer compared to the other projects, with a usage of 42.926 liters in Q1 2025. Meanwhile, HBP had the lowest fuel consumption, using 19 liters over the same period.

(In Kwh)




The chart on the side shows the electricity usage per kWh across six Triniti Land projects.

From the chart, it is evident that TGP is the largest electricity consumer compared to the other projects, with a usage of 178.783 kWh in Q1 2025. Meanwhile, HBP had the lowest fuel consumption, using 19 liters over the same period.

The chart on the side illustrates water consumption across each Triniti Land project.


From the chart, it is evident that TGP is the largest water consumer compared to other projects, using 5.487 m³ in Q1 2025.

This high water consumption at TGP is due to the ongoing construction of ongoing cluster in Sequoia Hills.

From the chart, PTB stands out as the largest user, consuming 135 bags in Q1 2025.
